## You Go, Girls!

Four Makena alumni women are advancing in interesting careers.

Mary Gatuku graduated in nursing in late 2017. Since then, Mary “beat the pavement” looking for a job at hospitals in Nairobi and its suburbs. In early March Mary joined my travel companion, Susan Reinecke, and myself for a long, leisurely lunch our first day in Kenya. During the lunch, Mary received a phone call from one of the hospitals where she had applied, Premier Medical Center in Kikuyu. They asked her to come in the next day, a Wednesday, so they could meet her. As soon as they met her, they hired her! That Thursday Mary began her job in the Emergency Department.

Rachel Njeri also graduated in nursing and—following the original vision of the Makena Children’s Foundation—returned to her home village of Maraigushu to make life better for the residents there. Rachel got a job delivering babies in the newly completed maternity wing of the Maraigushu Dispensary. To mark the occasion of the first baby born at the Dispensary, a photo of Njeri and the new baby were put up on Nakuru County’s website. A United Nations employee in Nairobi took note of the photo and promptly invited Njeri to attend a UN sponsored three-day workshop on Primary Care. Early the next morning, Njeri took a matatu to Nairobi to attend the session. It was a vibrant experience. Njeri says, “This workshop changed my life.”

Martha Waithira is in her third year of teaching first grade in Nairobi. Seeking a little adventure, Martha has applied to a program that brings Kenyans to China to teach English to children.

Hannah Wanja, the first student brought in to the Makena Children’s Foundation—she rightfully refers to herself as “the pioneer”—continues in her job as an accountant at the banking institution K-Unity. She is on track to complete her CPA by the end of this year. Next year, she plans to go for a Masters Degree in Finance Development.

The intelligence and initiative these four young women demonstrate surpasses even our high expectations for them. Congratulations!



## Days for Girls: One More Thing to be Proud Of!

We agree with the members of the Makena Alumni Club (MAC) that the best way they can repay their American sponsors is to pay it forward—to take on community service projects that benefit other Kenyans. In March, the young women of MAC partnered with another international nonprofit, **Days for Girls**, to insure that 50 Kenyan girls can stay in school.

Many adolescent girls in developing countries miss school one week of each month because they cannot afford feminine sanitary supplies. **Days for Girls** addresses this problem by supplying reusable sanitary pads. These pads—in bright, colorful kits—can be used for three years if washed properly. Before distributing the kits, the young women of MAC completed the online **Days for Girls** training, learning not only how to teach others how to sanitize the pads but also gaining thorough knowledge about reproduction and important subjects like human trafficking. They shared their knowledge and donated 50 kits to seventh and eighth grade girls at Mitamaiyu Primary School in their home village of Maraigushu.



# Will You Change the World?

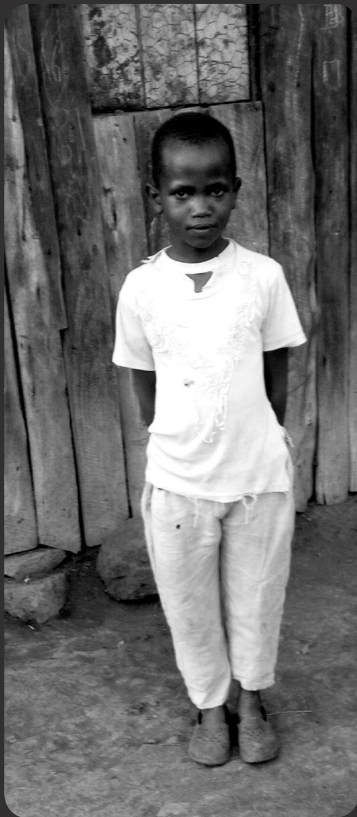

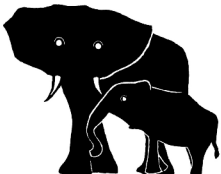
