Full Circle: Thoughts from a Kenyan Traveler

Generous Makena donor Annette Batzer accompanied Makena president Anne Batzer (they are sisters-in-law) on her recent working trip to Kenya. Annette brought her background as a Nurse Practitioner and her wealth of years of nonprofit and international experience, which contributed to all of the meetings. Here are Annette's thoughts on her experience:

I was privileged to return to Kenya with Anne. My first experience was as a tourist on safari in 1995, the trip that birthed Makena. I found Kenya to be a magical place with landscapes, wildlife and cultures so dissimilar to ours in North America.

Memories of traveling as a tourist bumped alongside me as we met with our students, their schools, families, communities and the wonderful Makena staff. In 1995 I recall traveling on the road's dirt shoulder because the roads were too potholed. Now, we drove on pavement. Running water is present in most cities, though there is still no drinking water from any tap. People continue to walk long distances and use public matatus (though people no longer hang off the backs or sides of these vans.) Small stalls still fill the dirt tracks along the roads. In some places western attire has replaced the colorful tribal dress.

Most importantly though, the generous and warm nature of the people is unchanged. Deep gratitude was expressed in every meeting.

The impact of Makena is abundantly apparent. Alumni are navigating adult lives, mentoring new graduates, dialoguing about the changing educational system and employment scene and helping each other to future success. All the while, they are starting beautiful families—children who will benefit from having educated parents.

The Makena students come from the Maraigushu region which has allowed these families to join together to benefit each other in ways that they could not have done individually. Makena's rippling effects that impact one child, one family, one village, one region will endure. What an honor to experience Makena!




"The Example of Elephants"
